



Councilman's Corner

Akron Prepares to put Rosie to Work

Recently I had the opportunity to attend a ceremony marking the beginning of the Ohio Canal Interceptor Tunnel. A true to scale photo of "Rosie", the 45 foot high TBM (tunnel boring machine) which will dig the tunnel, was on display.

This 6,200 foot long underground structure, which will have the capacity to store 25 million gallons of combined sewer water during a heavy rain event, will serve to capture combined sewer overflow water and treat it after a significant rain has passed. Currently, during these storms some of this untreated water passes directly into the Cuyahoga River.

The ceremony also marked the start of a new Towpath Trail route through this part of downtown. It was perfectly appropriate for us to have had a little rain that morning. One of the things we are doing is preparing Akron residents for the rains of the future, as we construct and re-construct portions of our sewer system and Water Reclamation Facility to last the next 100 years.

We've already begun work on remediating our combined sewer overflows. In fact, we have spent almost 400-million dollars in the last 30 years to provide for a better environment.

Water quality in the Cuyahoga River has improved to a point that it now supports aquatic life, and contributed to the return of the Great Blue Herons at our Water Reclamation Facility in the Cuyahoga Valley.

A year ago, Akron broke ground for the Cascade Village Storage Basin, and our plan includes many projects that will allow us to meet the demands of the U.S. and Ohio EPA's. While it is costly, we are trying to take maximum advantage of what is the largest construction program in the 190 year history of the City of Akron.

Ward 9 Councilman's Meetings

Councilman Freeman holds a public meeting on the first Tuesday of every month at the Kenmore Senior/Community Center, starting at 7:00 pm. Please join him at 880 Kenmore Boulevard to discuss your community and your city! The next meeting is Tuesday December 1st.

Akron is using new construction delivery methods and consultant hiring practices that incorporate local labor and diversity goals. For example, our tunnel contractor will exceed the State of Ohio's goals for the employment of economically and socially disadvantaged women businesses and minority business enterprises. We have partnered with the Akron Urban League and Akron Summit County Community Action, to provide job training to local residents.

This project will make Akron waterways cleaner than they have been since our ancestors made this city an industrial powerhouse in the 19th century. This program will provide for the quality of life that is deserved by the Akron residents. It will also attract future businesses and companies to want to expand and relocate to Akron due to the high quality of life.

City Council has been concerned about the costs of this entire project, and we are encouraged that with an Integrated Plan – that is, using more "green" infrastructure along with optimizing the "gray" infrastructure of pipes and tanks to meet our clean-water goals, we will save money. We are continuing to seek ways to make this important and necessary project more affordable for our residents while providing local jobs.

The real beneficiaries of our long-term investments will be our children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren. As always, thank you for allowing me to continue to serve our city and community!

Kenmore High School 2015-16: A Community Update

Under the leadership of building principal Byron Hopkins, in his sophomore year with Akron Public Schools, Kenmore High School had another successful start to the 2015-16 year as the hallways and classrooms filled with returning teachers and students. The custodial staff, led by Mr. John Wasson, had the building in top shape and they helped many teachers change room locations in August, all part of a reorganizational strategy implemented by the school administration. Kenmore's two counselors, Allene Slawter and Christa Nuru, worked endlessly to ensure all students had a schedule that would fit their graduation needs and support their interests. Kenmore's cafeteria staff, led by Mrs. Sue Byard, was well prepared from the beginning to serve breakfast and lunch to over 500 students enrolled at Kenmore. Finally, the building's three secretaries, Mrs. Caley, Mrs. Decsi, and Ms. Hartman, all put in many hours to convert all the school files to digital format and assist with the changes to the building.

We are also fortunate to have many new staff members on board this year. To quickly introduce each; Mrs. Tess Booth (Intervention Specialist, Science), Ms. Amanda Rogers (Spanish), Ms. Rachel Ference (Intervention Specialist, Math), Mrs. Tracey Bowman (MD teacher), Ms. Virginia Barborak (Intervention Specialist, English), Ms. Amanda Rasor (Intervention Specialist, English), Ms. Danielle Hillman (Math), Mrs. Mercedes Mooney (Spanish ½ day), Mr. Keith Gatti (long-term English substitute) and Mr. Mark Tavenello (APS Online Instructor). We also want to welcome members of the NE Ohio College Now staff who are working closely with our guidance department to ensure students who want to access college opportunities can do so. Together, with the returning staff members, they all work daily to educate our students and guide them in the direction of choosing a pathway to college, the military, or a career of their choice!

There were many changes to the design and function of the school. The administration made the decision to organize the students and staff by grade level to the best of our ability. This model has proven successful across the country. As a result, students in each grade level have their classes in close proximity to one another. For example, our incoming class of 2019 (our ninth graders) have their core content course all on the third floor.



Along the lines of grade level changes, the administration opted to have our weekly PLC's (Professional Learning Communities) change from content specific to grade level specific. PLC's are held every Tuesday during our teachers' common planning times. These are period-length meetings in which discussions about innovative learning strategies and teaching techniques are shared amongst the group.

Each teaching staff member is required to complete a 5-Step Process document per unit of study. This is part of the ongoing evaluation of teaching and learning as administered by



Akron Public Schools. Often called "5-Step" for short, this document uses data to drive instruction in the form of pre-assessments (before the content is delivered) and post-assessments (after the content has been delivered). By using these evaluative assessments, teachers can interpret the data to determine individual strengths and weaknesses of the students and tailor the manner in which they deliver the content accordingly. Staff will use formative assessments (techniques to determine if students comprehend what is being learned) during critical points in the delivery of instruction.

Administration did receive news over the summer that the Ohio Department of Education (ODE) has placed Kenmore in a category called "Priority Schools". As a priority school, Kenmore will now receive additional state funding to help with the efforts to improve the quality of education and students' academic performance. The focus will be across all grade levels and we will remain a priority school for three years.

At the end of that period, there will be an evaluation of the efforts made and, if necessary, changes will be suggested by ODE. Kenmore's administration will soon meet with ODE's transformation specialist and once we do we will certainly communicate that with our community. In the meantime, we are asking you to attend an informational meeting titled "**Title I Funding at Kenmore: An Open Invitation to Parents and Our Community**". The meeting will be held at 5:30 pm December 3rd, 2015, at Kenmore High School's auditorium and is open to the public -- with a specific request to attend for all parents and/or guardians of current Kenmore High School students. We will discuss how the Title I money will be spent this year at Kenmore and take any questions you may have about the process. We need your support to make us successful and look forward to seeing you at the meeting.

In closing, we are excited about the opportunity to continue providing educational services to the students at Kenmore. The work is hard and the challenges are substantial but with the entire staff and community support the possibilities are endless. 
Kenmore Historical Society News

The real push was Harry G. Haynes still in the front, and with him N. R. Steiner, now dead. The town was named by them after a fashionable Boulevard in New Jersey." Reference: Souvenir Book of Akron & Vicinity with Brief History of Summit County, Showing its Host of Industrial and Commercial Enterprises. Issued by the Akron Building Trades Council, July 1st, 1919.

The Secret History of the House at 915 Kenmore Boulevard

The year was 1900, and the small village of Kenmore was slowly evolving into a municipality, with a growing number of businesses emerging. One of the new city's most prominent citizens was an educator and real estate developer named M.C. Heminger.

Originally from Clinton, Ohio, Heminger had foreseen the growth of Kenmore, and committed to moving to the boulevard, building a new school, establishing a real estate investment company and breaking ground on his future home at 915 Kenmore Boulevard. Construction began that year, and was completed using the technology and tools of the day: A horse and plow did the majority of the digging, and the corners and sides were left to good-old-fashioned manpower, using picks and shovels.

The magnitude and difficulty of the task is illustrated by the fact that large boulders were moved to the foundation of the basement, with smaller boulders rolled in closer to ground level. Consider this: there was no footer (the structural members which transmit the concentrated loads of the structure to the soil, which strengthens the building) installed. Therefore, the boulders were laid on bare ground. Talk about no-frills construction!

Heminger and his family moved into their new residence slightly before the construction on the house was completed in 1901. The house was spacious, with hallways as wide as rooms, and 9 foot tall ceilings. The doors, banisters and main beams consisted of solid oak, which can explain their durability more than a century later.

The floors were hardwood, and poplar wood was chosen for the woodwork, upstairs doors, exterior sheeting and siding, due to its hardness and being more dent-resistant than pine.

Since many of our modern, taken for granted conveniences were unavailable at the time, the house was equipped with a fresh water well, cistern and brick outhouse. The foundations of these structures are still in place today.

Heminger took great pride and enjoyment of his large front porch, where he could sit back, relax, and enjoy watching Kenmore grow.

However, things did not go smoothly for Heminger. He was unable to manage his money, made several disastrous investments, and was unable to keep his real estate ventures from going broke. The company and many of his properties were taken over by the Akron Reality Company, and Heminger experienced a reduction in status, from owner to employee. In addition, he was subjected to the indignity of losing his home, and was forced by financial constraints to move out of Kenmore. The Heminger family landed on Beck St, in the Highland Square area of Akron. His beloved home became a rental property for the next several years. Heminger himself faded into obscurity, save for the school named after him on Kenmore Boulevard. The school opened in 1905, and Heminger won a victory by insisting that the school needed four rooms, while officials felt two rooms were adequate. Heminger won, and the school added two more rooms.

By 1920, Kenmore's growth continued at a slow but steady pace, with several small retail businesses meeting the needs of the increasingly populated community. The better paying manufacturing jobs were located toward downtown Akron, although Kenmore's founders never abandoned their vision of creating a community similar to what O.C. Barber built in the town next door that to this day bears his name: Barberton. That town combined the small-town allure of Kenmore with a fledgling manufacturing base.

After WWI ended, Kenmore was a bit adrift, searching for an identity. The "Roaring Twenties" would help that quest, in a colorful way. America was in the grip of sweeping, rapid-fire, chaotic change, and Kenmore was no exception. The Volstead Act (prohibition) went into law January 16th, 1920. But much of the population refused to comply with the unpopular, non-alcoholic edict, and speakeasies flourished, along with gangsters and Flapper girls, a 1920's term for wild, fun-loving, strong-willed women.

Incidentally, the flapper girls placed so much importance on their slender appearance that they radically changed their diets, from the meatand potatoes fare that was the norm of the day to a heavy intake of fresh vegetables and fruits. In fact, the so-called "modern" grapefruit diet was popular among the flapper girls of that era.

Contrary to the 1950's television show "The Untouchables", federal law enforcement was a day late and a dollar short in stamping out alcohol. And Kenmore was no exception.

During that exciting time, the house at 915 Kenmore Boulevard became the Nome Club, a private establishment rumored to be run by none other that that infamous bail bondsman "Whiskey Dick" Percoco. Anyone looking for a good time in Kenmore could not go wrong at the Nome Club. The booze flowed freely, and the women were wild and ready to party.

The entrance of the club was totally private, thanks to the sliding doors in the wall. The four room upstairs were no longer the domain of the Heminger family. Instead, they were reserved for "private entertainment" of the gentlemen patrons by one of the girls.

A room downstairs was the billiard room, covered by a thick cloud of cigar smoke, with plenty of libations and loud conversation. The construction of the billiard table speaks volumes as to the strength of construction at that time. It was a solid, massive and heavy structure – so heavy that it caused the floor to settle, which resulted in the floor being raised back to it's normal level years later.

There was also a separate room for private discussion of deals or other business matters. The rear exit in the kitchen served as an escape valve in case a raid occurred, and the patrons were forced to scamper out in a hurried manner. It was also the path to the well and outhouse.

But all good things come to an end, and with the repeal of prohibition and the great depression, the pace of life slowed. The property at 915 Kenmore Boulevard found itself on the market once again. Abraham Milton Lackey was now next up in the ownership line. As a man entering old age, he was retired and looking for a location that offered the tranquility for him and his wife Kate to live out their final years.

Lackey, or "Milt" as he liked to be called, arrived in Kenmore around the turn of the century from Pennsylvania, where he became skilled in oil drilling. He originally drilled wells for Colonial Salt, the forerunner of the Diamond Crystal Salt Company. He loved his adopted neighborhood, but he was not in Kenmore for long. In December of 1931, Milt was tragically killed in an accidental shooting while hunting. He widow remained at the 915 residence until her passing in 1934.

The property then became a rental again, until the next owner entered the scene. Willis G. Pettit, a former rum runner for "Whiskey Dick" and a patron of the Nome Club, knew the property, and owned the Empire Service Station on the corner of 12th Street and Kenmore Boulevard. Also, Pettit had known the Lackey family.

Willis scrapped together a small amount for the down payment, and was forced to borrow the remaining amount from two private lenders ("loan sharks") at 6% interest, an astronomical sum in those days, thanks to the banks reluctance to make loans, regardless of who was asking. However, Pettit worked things out, and the paperwork was recorded in 1936.

However, things were not all peaches and cream for Pettit. The house was in total disrepair, due to the years of neglect. Extensive cleaning and repairs were needed. But Pettit was not a man to be deterred by any obstacles, and before long the house was sparkling.

Fast-forward to 2015. The house is now an unbelievable 115 years old, and has been the property of the Pettit family for a remarkable eight decades! In a testimonial to the self-sufficiency that was a trademark of previous generations, two cherry trees, a pear tree, a plum tree, a peach tree, an apple tree and grape arbors have been on the property.

As a statement of the quality of construction and workmanship of a long-forgotten America, the house is to this day is actually in better condition that when it was originally built.

If only those walls could talk!

Socks have been a popular topic since Dr. Seuss wrote about them in his famous book, Fox in Socks! Well socks were popular at Sam Salem CLC in October as we had another fabulous Socktober! Students in Mrs. Kalil's classroom learned that there are many people who are homeless, and one thing that they need are socks. They learned this after watching a video by "Kid President" on YouTube; last year 2 million people across the country helped collect socks, and Sam Salem CLC collected 891 pairs of socks! The socks were donated to Project RISE, which reaches out to the families in our own Akron Public School district who are experiencing homelessness, last year they worked with 750 families to serve 1,762 students.

The Akron Public Schools have a focus on service learning, a teaching strategy that incorporates service in the community with classroom curriculum. Students are often the recipients of items, but are not often provided the opportunity to be the giver. Service learning gives an opportunity to help students see communities as places of learning. They are expected to reflect on their work, and also take learning beyond the classroom and grow through active participation in thoughtfully organized activities and experiences.


