New "Movement" and Performance Art Studio Opens on Kenmore Boulevard in Building with Legacy of Dance

The building located at 1015 Kenmore Boulevard is probably best known to Kenmore residents as the longtime home of **Etta Mae Smith Studio of Dance**, which moved into the space in 1964.

However, the building was sold this spring and while the ownership and the name have changed, the space will continue to operate as a dance, yoga, and performance art studio for years to come as **The Center Dance + Yoga Studio**.

"I started dancing at **Etta Mae Studio of Dance** when I was five years old," said Gina Wilson, owner of **The Center**. "I met two of my best friends here, and one of them is now teaching various yoga and meditation classes here. A dance school like this is such an important thing because it brings people in the community together."

Rather than operating on a recital or class season type of model, **The Center** operates on a "drop-in" model where anyone can drop-in and pay for a single class as they wish. While this model is not new to the yoga world, it is not as common to dance studios in our area.

Gina hopes **The Center** will eventually evolve into a performing arts hub where performers come to get all of their needs met and is working to add music lessons to the programming.

"I'm also a cellist and a choir director, and with the news of Miller South coming to Kenmore I just really want to offer a center to help serve performing artists of all types," Gina explained.

The Center began hosting regular classes in June, but will celebrate its official grand opening Saturday, October 7th, at noon with a ribbon cutting, raffles, performances, demonstrations, and a silent auction to help raise funds for the renovation and modernization of the studio.

Ohio's First Cat Café and Wine Bar Now Open on Kenmore Boulevard

On Saturday July 15th, Akron-native Nicole Farrell opened **Whiskers & Wine Cat Lounge** at 932 Kenmore Boulevard. It's the first cat café and wine bar to open in Ohio. "We wanted to be in a community that needs the traffic. Where businesses have the opportunity to bring more people in and be lasting," Nicole explained of her decision to bring her cat lounge to Kenmore.

Whiskers & Wine is focused on finding senior, "bottle babies," and paralyzed cats forever homes. Recently, she rescued 20 cats from Central Arkansas that were on a euthanasia list.

Visitors to Whiskers &Wine have the opportunity to meet a number of adoptable cats, all of which have been spayed, neutered, vaccinated, and dewormed. There is a \$10 cover charge to visit with the cats and the money goes toward helping Whiskers & Wine pay for the care of the animals.

Additionally, **Whiskers & Wine** offers a café space for guests to work, shop, and enjoy free coffee, free tea, or purchase snacks and other beverages. "Since we're technically a bar you have to be 18 or older to come to **Whiskers & Wine**, but we have monthly kid's days," Nicole explained.

If you find a cat you want to take home, **Whiskers & Wine** uses a simple adoption process that requires you to answer a few questions through conversation with staff. The process ensures you and your home are a good fit for the cat you are hoping to adopt. **Whiskers & Wine** does not accept cats off the street or drop offs, however Nicole hopes to establish a local coalition with other rescues to advocate for cats and their well-being.

Whiskers & Wine is open Wednesday through Saturday from noon until 8:00 pm, Sunday from 11:00 am until 5:00 pm, and is closed on Mondays and Tuesdays. For more information, visit whiskersandwine.co.

Remembering Smith Elementary School

After standing tall at 941 Chester Avenue for 105 years, Smith Elementary School began to crumble to the ground last week. In the days that followed the wrecking ball arrived to take down what remained of the building and Kenmore said goodbye to a piece of neighborhood history.

Smith Elementary School was constructed in 1918 and named in honor of Fred E. Smith – a leader in the early development of Kenmore who donated the land where the school was built. There were few homes near the school when it opened and some members of the community never expected there would ever be enough children to fill it.

When the school opened it was surrounded by brush, trees, and rock piles and did not have a playground. So in 1923 principal Ralph Myers and some of the older school boys grabbed axes, picks, and mattocks and began clearing away the trees and brush. The clearings they made provided spaces for the children to play and slide down the hill during recess.

Houses began springing up like mushrooms around the school and any doubts the community had about there ever being enough children to fill the school were laid to rest. By 1927 every available room in the school was in use and some classes even had to be taught in the basement. One teacher had 59 students in her classroom, while another was responsible for over 80 first graders.

Several improvements were over the years. WPA workers installed the stone wall around the playground during The Great Depression and in 1955 the building underwent an expansion just as enrollment was reaching 500 students.

Former teacher Alta Williams wrote of an incident that occurred at the school one night during the 1920s. One of the other teachers had decided to stay late only to find herself locked inside when she tried to leave. Not willing to spend the night in the school, she went to the basement, broke a window, and crawled out. She made it home safe that night, but the fur coat she was wearing was damaged during her escape.

Matthew Hines was a student at Smith Elementary School from 1979 until 1986 and has many memories from his years at the school, including his experiences with teachers like Miss Mills who was the first person to ever encourage him to be himself. He also remembers what lunch was like at Smith. "We didn't have a cafeteria, so for lunch we would go to the gym and purchase cartons of milk and frozen dinners that were then heated up in huge ovens on the stage," Matthew recalled.

In the early 1990s, Gina Wilson (who now owns The Center Dance + Yoga Studio on Kenmore Boulevard) attended Smith Elementary and remembers loving Mrs. Delac's art class. "Art class was the best," Gina said. "One year we made clay penguins and mine turned out so good that it wound up on display in the mayor's office!"

News arrived in 2015 that Akron Public Schools would close both Smith and Lawndale Elementary schools at the end of the school year. In September 2019, Smith Elementary School was auctioned off for \$44,000. The purchaser never made use of the building and it quickly fell into disrepair.

On April 17th, 2022, Smith caught on fire just three months after a multiplealarm fire destroyed Lawndale Elementary School. It took firefighters about an hour to get the fire under control and no cause or injuries were ever reported. The school would remain standing for another 15 months until it suffered a partial structural collapse during a summer night in July 2023.

Councilman's Corner

City Council Passes Resolution Asking U.S. EPA for Reconsideration of \$200,000,000 Project

On July 18th, the City of Akron has begun a formal dispute resolution process with the U.S. EPA over the city's proposed fourth amendment to the consent decree. The city's proposal would eliminate the need to build an expensive and unnecessary Enhanced High-Rate Treatment Facility (EHRT) next to the Towpath Trail. Instead, Akron has suggested alternative projects which would cost less than the EHRT and more significantly improve the quality of our waterways.

The U.S. EPA and the Department of Justice wants Akron residents and ratepayers to pay over \$200 million to build a facility that would only be used at most three times per year. Akron will already be capturing and treating 99% of all wet weather flows. That means over 2.3 billion gallons of water which previously went unchecked back into our waterways will now be treated. This has been a massive environmental feat and one Akron should be incredibly proud of. But it has come with a cost. The price tag for these improvements is already at \$1 Billion.

The city's modeling data shows that if Akron has to build the EHRT, sewer rates would have to be raised 20% more than if the city is allowed to move forward without the EHRT. The city has offered four alternative projects that would only total about a quarter of the cost of the EHRT.

SAMPLE LETTER

Dear Administrator Regan,

I am writing to you from Akron, Ohio, where the US EPA has said that my city needs to build a remote treatment facility along our Towpath Trail for an outlandish \$209 million that has not been activated for over a year. Building this facility will only have a 0.04% impact on bacteria levels to address recreational uses of the river, but the river is unsafe for recreational use at times that the facility would be activated. Instead of an unnecessary facility along the Towpath, Akron has proposed to eliminate failing septic systems in the watershed that create unhealthy recreational conditions on a daily basis.

Why is EPA insisting on a project that would substantially raise our rates when we can spend much less to ensure clean water every day for all?

Please consider the impact of your decision both on Akron ratepayers and those of us who enjoy the river. I hope you'll join the Ohio EPA in supporting Akron's proposal.

JOBS Program Needs Mentors

Jump On Board for Success (JOBS) has been serving the Akron community for almost ten years with one-on-one mentoring and job skills training for women and girls ages 13-35. Over the last two years, the number of participants has increased, while the number of available mentors has not kept up. There are currently 20 young women awaiting female mentors.

"We were fortunate to have two Beacon Journal articles written about the program last year, and with that came more girls," said Jennifer Herrick, Executive Director. The program also added a social media coordinator to the staff, promoting and attracting more participants.

The role of a mentor is to help build a participant's life skills like parenting, budgeting and finances, education, setting goals, and more. They act as a cheerleader and trusted advisor. Each mentor is paired with only one participant.

"Mentoring is the heartbeat of our program," said Herrick. "Each mentor-participant relationship is unique, and we want that relationship to grow organically."

Mentors are required to communicate with the participant a minimum of one hour per week (phone, text, meet-up, etc) and report those hours to JOBS staff. A participant contract acts as a guide, outlining what each participant wants to work on, or needs guidance with. Mentors receive a resource guide, and JOBS hosts two Mentor Boot camps each year for more focused training.
