Mayor Offers Change

The Kenmore Board of Trade held a special lunch meeting on April 2nd, to commemorate the 100th Anniversary of the founding of the city of Kenmore. Businesses & organizations located in Ward 9, as well as members of the other five boards who, along with Kenmore, make up the Akron Boards of Trade Council, were invited to Goss Memorial Church for this noon luncheon. A special certificate was handed out to those businesses who have resided in the Kenmore area for 10 years or more, with South Akron Awning recognized as having been around the longest (since 1913). The Kenmore Historical Society provided a slide show of photos of former & current businesses in Kenmore, but the highlight of the meeting was the guest speakers - Ward 9 Councilman Mike Freeman and City of Akron Mayor Donald Plusquellic.

Mayor Plusquellic started with some memories of his growing up in Kenmore, and then spoke about the importance of change. He noted that some ideas his administration offered in the past had failed, but others had performed much better than expected. Mayor Plusquellic commented that he would rather try new ideas, and sometimes fail, than have his administration do nothing new at all. The applause from the audience indicated that the business owners who attended this luncheon agreed with that statement.

After Kenmore Board of Trade President Scott Smith handed out the "Decade or More of Business" Certificates of Appreciation to those in attendance, Councilman Freeman & Mayor Plusquellic autographed them for the members. Both city officials stayed long after the meeting had ended, to speak with those business owners who had questions or comments.




SUMMER READING PROGRAMS

Councilman's Corner City Council Assures that Nuisance Patrol Will Be on the Watch - Response Process Now Streamlined

On April 21, Akron City Council passed legislation designed to allow for quicker, more efficient action by the city in cleaning up nuisance properties in Akron neighborhoods. So-called "nuisance patrols" will consist of the combined forces of inspectors from the departments of public service and public health. This ordinance will allow nuisance inspectors to work much more quickly than before.

The ordinance will allow Service Department inspectors to cite properties with certain health department violations, and health inspectors will be permitted to post notices for violations that used to be covered solely by the service department.

Public service typically inspects for high grass and weeds, junked cars, trash, broken windows and tires. Public health looks for things such as animal waste, evidence of rodent problems or garbage.

A house with a junk car in front, the yard with

high weeds, or loose trash, or the zoning violations that irritate responsible homeowners to no end, these things can bring neighborhoods down quickly. The goal of the ordinance is to be out in front and head them off before they get to the point of irritation.

Part of this initiative will be to instruct city employees who work in Akron neighborhoods, with the exception of nurses and epidemiologists, on a regular basis, to watch for nuisances and to report them. Sanitation drivers who notice potholes, police who see a house in bad condition or a road repair crew that sees a run-down house are being asked to take responsibility and make a note of or call in a complaint.

There will be four chief nuisance officers in charge of a section of the city. Each will be accountable for the condition of their area. This will allow for a faster and more efficient way than ever before. It is also important to note that there will be no increase in staffing for the initiative.

Ward 9 Councilman's Meetings

Councilman Freeman holds a public meeting on the first Tuesday every month at the Kenmore Senior/Community Center, starting at 7:00 pm.

Please join him at 880 Kenmore Boulevard to discuss your community & your city!

What can you do as a citizen? I would urge you to make use of the city's 3-1-1 call center to help Akron put property owners on notice that nuisance properties will not be tolerated.

One change in policy with the nuisance patrols is that the city will now levy fines for the third and subsequent violations by property owners. As a result, the process of enforcement will be quicker, penalties tougher and the community cleaner and safer.

The thanks for this initiative belong to many people. Thanks to our Mayor for his responsive initiative. Thanks to the collaborative effort of all departments involved. Thanks to all of you for being concerned Ward 9 residents.

Thank you for allowing me to serve our community. I am deeply grateful.

KENMORE CONNECTION CENTENNIAL SPECIAL

To honor the 100th Anniversary of the founding of the City of Kenmore, the Kenmore Connection is providing this special pull-out section. You are probably wondering who is "Mr. Grotstein". Mr. Louis Grotstein is the man who gave Kenmore its first library. Back in 1923 he owned the Kenmore Department Store (men's, ladies & children's wear) located at 1512 Kenmore Blvd (1004 Kenmore Boulevard today). He started the first book lending library in the back of his store. It was a small library where he checked books in and out. Several people donated books until he had about 1,000.

A year later the Fortnightly Club of Kenmore assumed responsibility of the growing enterprise in a donated room in the C. A. Wagner Building. Miss Cassie Harris, Librarian at Kenmore High School, catalogued the books. Several times, due to lack of funds, the second storeroom library had to close.

Then came Kenmore's annexation to Akron in 1928. It was Grotstein's idea to use the former Council chambers in the Kenmore City Hall building for a library. He learned the Water Department wanted to use the chambers for storage of equipment. He hurried to get Herbert Hirshberg, head librarian in Akron then, and they rushed over to the building and took possession of the Council chambers, the largest room in the city building. Then they notified the building authorities and the inspector they were going to move their books over there. (Don't think that would work today).

The Kenmore Branch (seventh branch) of the Akron Public Library opened on the second floor of the Kenmore City Hall building on May 30, 1930, with a larger collection of books than any previously opened branch.

Between May 26th and June 11th, before books could be checked out, fifty classes totaling 1,947 pupils with 56 teachers were introduced to the Library and the use of the books before registering. Children from third to eighth grade took cards home for signature and returned for books. A registration of 2,248 resulted -- 1,448 juveniles and 800 adults.

Kenmore's first two "librarians" were two high school girls who volunteered their services. They were Mildred Francis and Margaret McKinley.

Our present library building was dedicated January 1, 1957. We are eagerly awaiting the dedication of our new library being built now on the original site of the Kenmore City Hall.

IN MEMORY OF ARTHUR A. DOUBLEDEE

As we remember our past, we would like to honor the memory of Arthur A. Doubledee. Before Kenmore was annexed to Akron he was a deputy marshal in Kenmore, Ohio. He gave his life serving our community in 1916. He was 30 years old, married and lived on Manchester Road.

Two prisoners had escaped from the Kenmore Jail and fled to Akron. On October 12th, armed with warrants for the escapees, Doubledee and another officer went to Akron and arrested the two men near the intersection of Steiner and Sweitzer Streets.

As the marshals were leaving the area with the prisoners to board a streetcar back to Kenmore, one of the prisoners drew a knife and stabbed Doubledee in the back and face. Deputy Marshal Arthur A. Doubledee died while being taken to the hospital. Cause of death was listed as a stab wound through the heart. He is buried at Lakewood Cemetery.

Deputy Marshal Doubledee is listed on the official Akron Police Department website memorial page and in the department's history book. The police department has also had him added to the National and State Police Officer memorials.

KENMORE'S FIRST SCHOOL

The village of Kenmore was developed by the Akron Realty Company. M. C. Heminger was hired as their Secretary-Manager in June of 1900. When he moved with his family from Clinton to the new allotment, his household goods couldn't be delivered by a moving van because of the deep ruts on the boulevard due to recent rains. A canal boater brought his family's goods to a landing near the Colonial Salt Works, and a wagon pulled by four farm horses took two hours to bring the furniture up to Ohio Avenue, now 12th Street. His family was the first to live on Kenmore Boulevard.

The nearest school at that time was 11/2 miles away near Summit Lake. It was called District School No. 11 and was part of Coventry Township's school system. It was a one-room brick building with students in six grades with one teacher. The Heminger children had to walk that distance each day using the streetcar tracks for a sidewalk.

In November 1902, Mr. Heminger was elected to the township school board. Twelve new homes were being built and several more were planned for the spring. The Akron Realty Company gave six lots on Virginia Avenue, now 11th Street, for the building of a new school. Late in October of 1903, the school opened with 84 students ranging in age from 6 to 20. The building, now named Heminger, was called Kenmore School. There were two teachers. The principal E. F. Crites taught the upper grades, and Miss Rothrock taught the primary grades.

In May of 1907, the first class of four students graduated. Diplomas were presented by W. J. Watters, President of the School Board, to Elsie and Floyd Wagoner, Margaret Henry, and Vesta Heminger. Rev. W. Sprinkle of Civil War fame gave the class address. The class motto was "We will find a way or make one." The commencement program was held at Goss Memorial Reformed Church.

In 1908 the Village of Kenmore was incorporated and established its own school board The 1908 graduating class consisted of Richard B. Heminger and Ernest E. Ritzman.

An annex was added to the school in 19ll including a gym-auditorium. The school board didn't approve purchasing basketballs for the gym because the sport was felt to be too rough and of no educational purpose, so the boys and men teachers bought the first basketball and suits.

A two-room school, Lawndale, was erected on Foust Road, now Wilbeth Road, and in 1912 the first unit of Colonial School was built. With the addition of Colonial and Lawndale the first school building changed it name to Kenmore Central. By 1915, the schools had grown from 84 pupils with 2 teachers to 960 pupils with 32 teachers.



Church Celebrates New Home, Kenmore Centennial

The history of The Church on the Boulevard's striking home (754 Kenmore Boulevard), and of the congregation that built it, tracks precisely with that of the Kenmore Community they have served. "Boulevard Church" always called itself "The First Church in Kenmore."

As the community known as Halo was beginning to form, a number of its residents were converted at revival services in 1900 at the Hope Church (which has served from 1855 to the present in what is now the Castle Homes area). Desiring a church in their own community, they began to meet in rooms above W. J. Watters' store at the corner of Manchester Road and Boulevard. Soon they acquired a "used church", built in Manchester in 1874. They dismantled this 40 x 45 ft. frame structure, and erected it on Manchester Road between the railroad tracks and the present Wilbeth Road, facing east near A. J. Triplett's home. Mr. Triplett had donated the land. "Zion Evangelical Church" was dedicated December 21, 1901.

Soon it became clear that Halo's development was proceeding westward along the Boulevard, and the church decided to relocate to the present site at Boulevard and Seventh Street. The wooden church was again taken down and moved, and was dedicated in its new home on January 6, 1907 – a year before Kenmore was formally established.

The congregation soon outgrew its wooden home and began to make plans for a larger building. At the same time, they changed their name to Boulevard Evangelical Church in 1919. When the time came, they moved the wooden church yet again – a few doors down Seventh Street – and they worshipped there while the new structure was built. The cornerstone was laid June 26, 1921, and the present two-toned brick church was dedicated September 17, 1922.

Afterward, the "wandering church" was sold and remodeled as an apartment house. It still stands at 2211 Seventh Street. Its 1874 origin surely makes it one of the oldest buildings in Kenmore. "Boulevard Church," now The Church on the Boulevard, was constructed at a cost of \$57,000 by contractor Nelson Chaffin of Akron. The building is Kenmore's own example of an "Akron Plan" church, an architectural design invented by Akron industrialist (and Sunday School superintendent) Lewis Miller. His innovative First Methodist Episcopal Church was completed in 1870. The Akron Plan became very popular across America, especially between about 1890


The Church on the Boulevard today

and 1930. Our "Church on the Boulevard" is a very beautiful later example of the form. All are welcome to visit and see it.

The Boulevard congregation disbanded in 1990. In the following years the building has been home to several church groups, attorneys' offices, and an art gallery. Meanwhile, a suburban church was beginning to hear God's call to urban ministry. Now, after 86 years, this wonderful building is beginning a new phase of ministry and service to Kenmore.

After nearly 40 years on Greensburg Road, the Green Baptist Church prayed and took stock of its members' demographics and spiritual gifts. Feeling led to Kenmore, they began to participate in community ministries and activities such as First Glance and Teen Moms, the Kenmore Holiday Celebration, and Project SHINE. Our congregation acquired the 754 Kenmore Boulevard building, changed our name to The Church on the Boulevard, and held our first Kenmore services in September 2007.

The Church on the Boulevard is pleased to participate in Kenmore's Centennial Celebration, and we look forward to serving our Lord Jesus Christ during Kenmore's second century.



The Kenmore Historical Society now has a new logo. Ken Dague, a member and Trustee of our group, has designed our logo showing symbols depicting the history of Kenmore. The canal boat, trolley, salt derrick and City Hall were common sights and all very important in the development and growth of Kenmore. Ken has been a member since 2002.

KENMORE'S CITY HALL

Kenmore City Hall was built in 1916 at the corner of Kenmore Boulevard and 14th Street. It was demolished in 1974.

After Kenmore was annexed to Akron the building was still an important part of Kenmore. The old council chamber was used for the library. The room used by Police Chief William Poalson to question prisoners was used for a meeting place of the Union Missionary Society sewing circle who worked on Red Cross clothes for the needy. Another part of the building was used twice a week for the Health Department's Well Baby Clinic where they weighed, measured and vaccinated children between one and six years old. There was also a section used by the Family Service society three days a week, for interviewing needy in the southern district of Akron.

The police headquarters in the building was now Precinct 2, Akron's only precinct police station. The Kenmore fire station, still in the building, became known as Fire Station 10.

The last mayor to occupy the city building was H. V. Johnson. A familiar dentist, Dr. Charles F. Woods, then occupied the mayor's office for 43 years. He was 80 years old when he closed his dental practice on June 28, 1974.

In addition to regularly scheduled activities in the building, political organizations and veterans groups used the hall as a meeting place on occasion.

The only building custodian got the work done by permitting transients to sleep in the old jailhouse area in return for cleaning the building the next day.






