

Kenmore Cardinals Youth Baseball Team Takes the State Title for the 4th Year in a Row

The tradition of spending the first weekend of August in Alliance continued for the fourth summer in a row. Once again, the Kenmore Cardinals Youth Baseball team has won the Ohio Hot Stove State Championship at Butler-Rodman Park in Alliance making them 4-Time State Champions.

In 2005, the team, competing as 14 year olds, won the Ohio Hot Stove Class F State Championship. In 2006 the team had to move into a higher class because of age requirements. They won as 15 and 16 year olds making them the 2006 Ohio Hot Stove Class EE State Champions and again last year as 15 and 16 year olds making them the 2007 Ohio Hot Stove Class EE State Champions.

The Cardinals are getting older now and have again moved up to a higher class--Class E--which consists of 16 year olds to 18 year olds--even though they have two 15 year olds on the team. But that didn't stop their winning streak!! They proved themselves champions once again for the fourth time in a row becoming the 2008 Ohio Hot Stove Class E State Champions.

From there they went to Alliance, where they defeated the Waterloo Vikings by a score of 13 to 6 on Saturday, August 2, for the State Semi-finals. Then on Sunday, August 3, they went on to defeat the North Akron Tigers by a score of 3 to 2 for the 2008 Ohio Hot Stove Class E State Championship. (This game was a rematch of the 2006 EE State Championship when the Cardinals defeated the North Akron Tigers by the exact same score). It was said by many of the Alliance officials that this year's championship game was the best game played at Butler-Rodman Park for years.







Councilman's Corner

Vacant Houses- Vigilant Eyes

Obviously our nation has experienced a housing issue unparalleled in recent history. As we drive through our neighborhoods we see many houses boarded up and every time we watch the news or read a newspaper we get a steady diet of bad news on housing and on the economy in general.

It seems that everyone has an opinion on what the cause of these problems is. Often the blame is laid on the doorsteps of subprime or other mortgage borrowers. Those who are fortunate enough to have come through this crisis relatively unscathed often point, with disdain, at those homebuyers who: (choose one) paid too much, borrowed too much, or did not put enough money down when they bought or refinanced their home.

I want to point out that the great majority of subprime borrowers are performing as agreed on their mortgages. Some of them are not, of course, but the reason often is that they experienced a life changing event such as divorce, illness, job loss or reduction, job transfer, or even death. In the past when these events occurred, the house could often be sold and the mortgage paid off. But this time around houses prices have collapsed and the houses can not be sold for enough to satisfy the mortgages. This price collapse was unforeseen, and was not the fault of these unfortunate borrowers.

Every time a house goes into foreclosure and gets boarded up, the whole neighborhood suffers. It has been estimated that each boarded up house reduces surrounding values by as much as ten percent, so every homeowner is directly affected by what happens to his neighbors. I would ask that we not be quite so quick to judge a homeowner who may be losing his home. It just could be that there is nothing he could have done to prevent it, and you can be sure that he or she is feeling devastated.

What about when a house in your neighborhood becomes vacant? What then? Please, in your own self interest, monitor that house to see that it does not become a nuisance because of breakins, squatters, or even long grass. Please make

the effort to report suspicious activity, and make it obvious to all that the house is being watched. Again, this is in our own best interest. The values of our own houses depend on it.

Kenmore Library Celebrates Its Open House by Nicole Zickefoose

The grand opening for the new building was Saturday, September 6th. Festivities included an open house, ice cream social and ribbon cutting ceremony. Over 1400 people attended, including community members and staff. Library Director David Jennings, Summit County Executive Russ Pry, Akron Mayor Donald Plusquellic, City Council President Marco Sommerville, Kenmore Ward 9 Councilman Mike Freeman, and State Senator Tom Sawyer, D-Akron all spoke about Kenmore before the ribbon cutting. Branch Manager Kathy Forsthoffer and Friends of the Kenmore Library President Lee McCutchan had the honor of cutting the ribbon and being the first people to enter the new building through the front doors.

The Library provided vanilla and chocolate ice cream topped with library logo colored blue and orange M&M's. People were able to do the unthinkable- eat ice cream inside the library! Local artist Teresa Wolfe attended the open house to talk to the community and answer questions about her



artwork. The band Jen Scalis and Friends Band played jazz music for people's enjoyment. The band included Jim Guest, a local Kenmore High School graduate who played tenor saxophone. The band also included Don on drums, four hands on keyboard duets and Jen as a vocalist. Library staff members from other branches volunteered to work at the desk so that Kenmore's staff could visit with those who attended the open house.

A library first came to Kenmore in 1923 as a lending library that was housed in a department store by Louis Grostein. The Akron Public Library took over the collection after Kenmore annexed the city. In 1930 the Library was moved to the second floor of the Kenmore City Building at 957 Kenmore Boulevard. The Library shared the building with the fire department, bank and a doctor. The Fortnightly Club of Akron staffed the library. The building on 14th Street was dedicated on January 4, 1957. It was designed by Tuchman & Canute, architects. The new 2008 building was designed by Moody Nolan, Inc., architects, built by Summit Construction Company and cost \$2.15 million. The Kenmore library was the last branch to be built during the Library's building campaign. The campaign was paid for by taxpayer funds generated by the bond issue of November 1997.

Artwork of the Kenmore Library

There are many pieces of art that are spread throughout the new building. Some pieces have come from the old building, and some pieces are new to the Library. We have many different types of artwork using many different mediums.

The showpiece of the Children's Area is a cluster of stained glass sculptures. There are iridescent stained glass pieces that have been welded together to create a nature scene. The stained glass pieces include a sunflower, a monarch butterfly, a pink cosmo and three zinnias in a cluster. If you look closely, you will see a Kenmore cardinal on one of the leaves, and a lady bug on another.



The artwork was created by Teresa Wolfe. Wolfe graduated from Kent State University with a degree in Interior Design and lives in Highland Square. She worked on the artwork for quite some time. "The project occupied my life for three months," she said. Wolf added glass blown pistils to the flowers and put glitter in the grout. Her husband Bill installed the artwork. He mounted the glass pieces on three-quarter-inch plywood to mount on the wall.

Another new addition to the branch is a 1969 piece by Jody W. Klein. This is a large wood screen that was formerly housed at Main library. As carved into the piece, the materials used in the wood screen are courtesy of Akron Craftsman Press. The wood screen was created for the grand opening of the old Main library building, and used as a free standing room divider for the staff lounge.

The sculpture is made from old printing press letters and numbers set against each other at odd angles. They are arranged in a manner that represents classification categories and numbers of the Dewey Decimal system that is used for nonfiction items in public libraries. There are also toys, carvings and old pictures that illustrate these topics. For example, she used toy soldiers to illustrate war, and a tennis shoe to illustrate sports. This wood screen can be found in the Teen Area by the front desk.

A piece that has been with the library for over 40 years is a watercolor painting by Marc Moon. It was donated by the Garden Forum in October 1967. "The Sycamore Trail" is a watercolor painting of an old white farmhouse with a sycamore tree next to a country road. The Library brought the painting from the old building, but gave it a new look with a custom frame for the new building. The painting is on display in our conference room.

Watercolorist Marc Moon was born in Middletown, Ohio in 1923. After attending the Applied Art Academy in Akron, he later became an instructor and eventually the owner of the Academy. Moon has won numerous national and international awards for his paintings. He was a 2005 Arts Alive! nominee. Moon was also a member of the American Watercolor Society, the Salmagundi Club, the Hudson Valley Artists, and the Society for Painting in Casein. He died in Akron in 2006.

Another piece that is on display in the Children's Area is a piece called "Kenmore Kids." The Kenmore Kids painting was created during the 2005 Holiday Celebration at the Kenmore Cultural Arts Center. Terry Klausman helped local children paint a picture he designed. He finished the painting by outlining the figures, professionally framing it and donating it to the library. The artwork depicts neighborhood unity, with everyone holding hands. Klausman also donated a photo collage of some of the children who worked on the painting. He recently started his own business called Especially Art! studios. The business specializes in metal sculptures, murals, greeting cards, paintings, and all forms of commissioned artwork.

Another piece of art that has stayed with the Library through the move is a historical map. According to the painting it is an Aero view of William A. Johnston's Allenside Subdivision and the new Industrial City of Coventry. This painting has been with the library since before 1980 and is believed to have been used as an advertising piece for the company who developed the area. The painting is signed Kintz, Akron, O. This piece is displayed by the magazine area.

The Crawford Bindery, although out of business, is remembered through a piece of art that was donated to the Library. The bindery was located at 2249 14th Street for some time, but closed its doors in 2006. The piece is a depiction of a bookshelf with children's fairy tale books. The piece was created in the mid-90s and it was displayed in the bindery before it was donated to the Library.

Other art pieces on display at the Library are historical photos. Two large photos can be found by the copy machines. These were used for the Mayor's press conference to announce the Kenmore Centennial kick off. The kick off was on May 16, 2008 and was held at The Church on the Boulevard in Kenmore. Other historical photos are displayed in the community room and throughout the Branch. These photos are courtesy of the Kenmore Historical Society and Kenmore Friends of the Library.



If you have a friend you can trust, ask them for help. Walk way and cool down when feeling angry. Or go some place quiet to think before you act. And keep working at it!!! You can get in control. Tell a friend, family member or teacher what is happening. IGNORE the bully or say NO firmly and WALK AWAY. Don't fight back if you can help it. It's not worth getting hurt to keep possessions or money. Avoid being alone in places you know bullies may pick any or stick with a group. Do things and talk to someone and ignore the bully. 

In many cases, for less than a couple hundred dollars a year you can protect your valuables, like your furniture and clothes, from loss by fire, theft, wind and water damage or other covered hazards.

But many renters still don't believe they need insurance. A survey conducted by Cambridge Reports, Inc for the Insurance Information Institute found that fewer than three out of every 10 renters purchase renters insurance.

Many renters mistakenly believe their landlord's insurance will cover their own belongings. In fact, it would be extremely rare for a landlord's policy to extend to tenants' property.

To determine how much insurance coverage you'll need, take a complete inventory of your personal items. An insurance agent can help with this by estimating the total value of your property.

You'll also need to decide whether to opt for depreciated or limited replacement cost coverage.

Depreciated coverage is the cost to repair or replace your belongings minus depreciation. Let's say you bought a quality sofa with an expected useful life of 10 years. If it's now five years old and would cost about \$1,000 to replace, you could expect to receive about \$500 (less deductible) if your sofa was destroyed by fire. You would pay slightly more for limited replacement cost coverage, but you could expect to receive \$1,000 for your sofa minus your deductible.

You should also keep in mind that insurance coverage for some types of personal property is limited in terms of dollars. First Glance Expands into New Building By Noelle Beck

First Glance (FG) is continuing to expand in order to give more students in this community a place to go. First Glance hosts many different programs throughout the week; from teen moms to recreational nights to skateboarding. For a list of all the programs and times go to www.firstglance.org.

Originally starting in the Kenmore Community Center, FG has continued to grow over the past 8 years. After using the Community Center for only two years, the attendance was too large to host the students. In 2005, FG began to rent the space above Rent-A-Center. This 5,000 square foot facility has been a great place to host skateboarding, basketball, eating, and more. Last spring on Thursdays and Fridays, FG was averaging 200 students each night. It soon became clear there was just not enough space to accommodate all of these students. First Glance's Board, Staff and volunteers decided to purchase the Hibernian building that is attached to the space they rent above Rent-A-Center. In May the purchase was complete and the work began.

The first project undertaken was the renovation of the second floor of the former Hibernian's building. FG Staff received permission from their current landlord to put a doorway between the Hibernian's 2nd floor and the rented space above Rent-A-Center. Major renovations were then done to the facility with the help of over 100 volunteers who tore out walls, painted, cleaned, rebuilt bathrooms, built a snack bar area, and more. The former Hibernian's side hosts all of FG's computers, video games, tables, pool tables, etc. It is the more relaxed hang out area. The space above Rent-A-Center now hosts a full basketball court and a mini skate park for all of the active students that attend. On September 25th, First Glance reopened with both sides functioning. The students were so excited to see the new place, especially knowing it was done entirely

for them. The night was a huge success with so many students attending and so many excited about doing so.

The next two projects will be for our Teen Moms. Currently there are 40 young ladies who are part of this program. They meet at Prentice Funeral Home, again, simply because FG is out of space. Therefore, First Glance volunteers and workers will be turning the old bar in the former Hibernian's basement into a new facility for our Teen Moms. This will include a nursery, full kitchen, meeting/teaching room, and an area for scrap booking and sewing and more. This new space will allow for more students and for more activities to happen throughout the week for these girls.

In addition, on the first floor, FG is putting in a boutique for the girls to shop for baby essentials. Currently Tom and Mary McCombs graciously donate space on the boulevard for the boutique. All the baby items for the boutique are donated. The teen moms have to do homework, participate, bring friends, etc. to earn points which can be redeemed to buy items at the boutique.

This building addition is vital because First Glance hosts over 1,100 students each year. Purchasing the Hibernian's space and utilizing our rental area above Rent-A-Center, hopefully, will allow the program to grow, hosting even more students in the future.

In addition, several of the older students have come back this year to volunteer with First Glance. It is the hope of FG Staff that the majority of the volunteers who help will be former FG students.

Kenmore Homecoming Highlights! by Jan Williams




