



Kenmore Board of Trade Hosts Metro Parks at Picnic Luncheon



Gathered in the center of the street, these merchants of good deeds were looking beyond themselves and reaching out to another. In my mind, I pondered, "Is this what neighborhoods used to look like?" It is amazing what the absence of electricity and a neighbor in need can do to get folks out and talking with one another.



An Open Letter from the Coach!

The Kenmore Football Team is preparing to begin the 2011 football season with a group of 50 plus players that have worked hard during the off season to become bigger, faster and stronger. This football team is dedicated to restoring the glory that once represented the Kenmore community. I returned to coaching this football team with the idea that pride, hard work and dedication was not lost in our high school, but rather needed to awaken.

The football team that finished the 2009 season had fewer than 20 players and seemed to be lacking in an identity. As our staff took over in the late spring of 2010 we met with players about the direction that they were heading and how we were going to work with them to change the culture of losing that had taken hold. Please keep in mind that these players had thought they were working hard and that the results of going 0-10 three of the previous four seasons was just bad luck. Kenmore Football: Putting the Pride Back in the Kenmore Community

The Kenmore Cardinal football team has not always been a program looked upon as a prosperous or successful team within the realm of athletics at Kenmore High School. Ed Peltz's job as the new (again) head coach was to find a way to change this reputation amongst the students, potential athletes, administration, as well as the Kenmore community. Having coached previously for 15 years at various schools throughout Northeast Ohio, Peltz came into the 2010 football season with an understanding as to exactly what needed to be done to change the direction the program was headed. The first thing on his mind was to raise the numbers. The 2009 season ended with a total of 18 players; Peltz ended the 2010 season with 46 players, a dramatic increase that only provided a glimpse into the positive trend happening within the program.

Raising the numbers also meant raising the team record, from 0-10 in the 2009 season to 2-8 in the 2010 season. These steps were only a glimpse into Peltz's vision. Next was to change the attitude and approach of the players with two steps: being held accountable in the classroom, and being responsible to condition in the off-season, whether with the team or by playing another sport. The athletes found themselves reshaping their approach in preparation both mentally and physically. Peltz also decided that rebuilding the relationship with the Kenmore Youth Football Program as well as Innes Middle School would be crucial to keeping students in Kenmore, a critical element for not only the football team but Kenmore in general.





The 2011 football season continues the positive momentum Peltz began to create coming into the 2010 season. There are 50+ players participating in the program, including both a large number of veteran players who have received an extensive amount of playing time and experience in the previous year as well as a large influx of incoming freshman. Just as Peltz wanted, the attitude towards the entire program seems to have shifted to something fresh and exciting. For the players, confidence has replaced their once apprehensive approach to football.

The Kenmore Cardinals will host four home games this upcoming fall season and as Peltz explains, "We want to make our stadium the place to be for the Kenmore Community on Saturdays. One of the most important parts to our season is the support from the community and the school, we have a really great thing going with this team and I'm excited to see where we can go." Their non-league schedule allows the team to play in some of the best facilities in Northeast Ohio versus competition that has had success, creating a great opportunity for the athletes to show everyone what extraordinary talent Kenmore football has. As the reputation of Kenmore football changes, Peltz wants to reiterate, "Our team has such pride, and we want the community to feel that and support us where we are headed."

This fall is the time to throw on your Cardinals gear and head out to the football stadium to watch some of the finest athletes at Kenmore High School show what they've worked so hard for. Now that's something to get excited about!





Kenmore Historical Society News

After hearing the news that the Kenmore Post Office might close, I decided to look back at the history of the Kenmore Post Office.

Around 1898 the settlement of Halo was located in the area of Kenmore Boulevard and Manchester Road. Halo soon became known as Kenmore. David Bersnak, our president, came across someone who has postmarks showing "Halo Ohio" dated 1898 and 1901.


Our earliest Kenmore post office seems to have been located at the corner of Kenmore Boulevard and Manchester Road. I found an Akron Press newspaper article dated April 27, 1908, telling about a fire that totally destroyed the Kenmore Supply Company and Kenmore Post Office. A. F. Hoffman of the Kenmore Supply Co. was badly burned around the face and hands while saving books, valuable papers, money and the mail. A gasoline lighting system was the suspected cause of the fire. Akron fire companies were on their way to help with the fire, but part of their apparatus got stuck in the mud and did not reach Kenmore. A bucket brigade was used to fight the fire. Kenmore Supply recovered from its loss and is shown in later Kenmore history.

According to the Akron City Directories, the post office moved west on the Boulevard to the area of the present Stone's Kenmore Mattress & Furniture building from 1914 to 1946.

The post office moved to 2200 15th Street in 1946 and stayed there 53 years, until it moved to the present location at 2394 East Avenue (formerly the site of Darrow's Family Foods).

There was a Lawndale Post Office located at the streetcar Stop 96 on Kenmore Boulevard at 29th Street in 1918. D. A. Whatmough was the first postmaster at Lawndale. Wayne Hurd, who has lived in Kenmore all his life, told us his father, Arthur R. Hurd, then became postmaster in 1922. The Lawndale Post Office was moved across the 27th Street viaduct to Springfield Road (now Waterloo Road) in 1927. Wayne said back then the people would come to the post office to pick up their mail. Home delivery didn't start in our area until 1938. Bob Wilkey remembers when mail was delivered twice a day in the 40's. When I was growing up in the late 40's on Battles Avenue I remember having to walk to 21st Street to pick up the mail. There was a row of several mailboxes where the mail was delivered.

Kenmore High School All-Class Reunion

"25 Hill" – with all its glamour and hoopla – is not the only Akron-based film to be premiered in our city this year. On a smaller scale and shorter on glamour and hoopla, but equally strong on purpose, is a 2-hour, 10-minute documentary DVD – "Duty, Honor, Country–Kenmore's Greatest Generations, 1908-2010" - which will be premiered Saturday, September 10th at the Kenmore Senior Community Center (the corner of Kenmore Boulevard and 11th Street), when the class of 1945 hosts an all-class reunion.

The first half of the DVD will be shown starting 11:00 AM. It documents the all-class reunion program last September 11th when some 500 alums, notables, and friends assembled to honor those Kenmore men and women who served our country in wars going back to World War I and continuing to Afghanistan. A full military salute was made for 72 men who made the supreme sacrifice, and their names are inscribed on a plaque now on the Honor Wall at Kenmore High School. In the second half, shown after lunch, veterans and family members of relatives share memories of World War II and the hostilities in Korea, Vietnam, and Iraq, and Afghanistan.

The DVD was written and directed Kenmore grad Sam Salem and produced in cooperation with award-winning filmmaker Peter Fields. Narrators are former Kenmore High principal Elizabeth Neidert; World War II veteran Walt Stine, who at 17 participated in Naval campaigns throughout the Pacific; and Retired Air Force Major General Don Jenkins, who served in Korea and in the Strategic Air Command, also a former Akron U law school dean. Other participants include Kenmore alum Mayor Don Plusquellic and representatives of the Kenmore Historical Society, Korean War Veterans, VFW Firestone Post, American Legion, Kenmore High Jr. ROTC, and the Akron Fire and Police Departments.

Featured in the DVD is Akron school music teacher Kim Shama Hanna, who sang her composition "United We Stand," as well as "American Anthem" and "Taps."

"The DVD was made possible largely through the generosity of the Kenmore Alumni Association and A.J. Schulman, Inc., in memory of late CEO Bill Zekan," explained Salem.

A group photo will be taken by photographer John Ashley and made available to the attendees, who are asked to wear or bring the bright red, black, and blue commemorative T-Shirts distributed last year.

Invitations have been mailed to some 300 alums and friends. "Cost of the luncheon and DVD showing is \$16.00," said Joyce Starner, treasurer. "We are expecting a large response, so please respond ASAP," she advised. "Because of space limitations, only those buying luncheon tickets or our guests will be admitted."



Teenagers Care About Kenmore

The teenagers at The Church on the Boulevard (C.O.B.) truly care for the Kenmore community. This year the teens at C.O.B., (under the leadership of Jim Eplinger, missions director) decided not to "go" on a mission trip, but to "stay" on a mission trip, right here in Kenmore. In part it had to do with the economy, but it had even more to do with the community. Seventeen teenagers, three preteens and as many adults took a week of their summer vacation in late July to work together for God's glory and the good of the community.

Projects were arranged, such as the painting of a large house on the Boulevard. The kids scraped and baked as they labored in the hot sun. They proceeded to mow yards, clear vacant lots and whack weeds. The teams took down vines connected to fences and even cleaned out two overgrown gardens on the Boulevard. In addition, on Monday, teams worked with the distribution of food at the Food Bank.

During devotions that afternoon, they were reminded to be flexible. The word which was used was "fluid": You have to go with the flow. Plans change. Be like water. Be fluid.

That night it rained like crazy. The next morning telephones kept ringing. The rain had caused flood damage in a number of local basements. The teams of teens and adults responded to the calls. They took rugs, furniture and boxes to the curb, all the while ministering to those who had lost the total content of their basements, including irreplaceable pictures and memorabilia. As the day went on the temperature rose, but the labor continued. No one complained (not even about the smell), no one grew overly weary, and each one considered it a privilege to be of help.

By that evening, lawns had been mowed, flooded basements had been emptied and the house on the Boulevard was almost finished. That night no one needed to be reminded to turn the light off. Every teen and adult dropped off to a well-deserved and restful sleep.

The next morning everyone awoke to the realization that they were over the hump. It was midweek, and the house and front porch were completely painted by the end of the day. Only the back porch remained. Their labor had paid off. They had climbed to new heights, ascending to the top of the ladder of success.

That night they gathered at the gazebo (at the end of the Boulevard) for a time of fun and relaxation. Games were played and music was made. Then suddenly the sky grew dark! Over 150 water balloons were launched - by the adults! The teens never saw it coming. They scattered with the hope of rallying enough to make a counter assault and the fun continued.

The next morning, the back porch of the house was finished. The temperature rose to a record-breaking high and most of the teens took a turn washing cars, keeping cool in the shade. The rest were down on the Boulevard cutting brush. It was a great week for all.

By the end of the week, the teens had painted the large house on the Boulevard, washed over 30 cars (including a VW Bug convertible), cleaned out four basements (three with sewage), stained two decks, cleaned the church, mowed two fields and cleared out two walled gardens on the Boulevard. The kitchen crew prepared about 495 delicious meals.

There were 16 teenagers and 17 adults. The ages ranged from 12 to 75 years old (there were even a few preteens who were not allowed to spend the night). It was a good week. It was a hard week. It was a life-changing week. From Sunday night until Friday afternoon not one discouraging word was uttered. The only sound was the harmony of working together and the youthful expressions of joy in working for others.

People often ask, "Is there hope for kids of today?" Well last week I watched the adults of tomorrow! Not only do they have hope but also compassion, initiative and a heart to serve. Wondrously, it all revolves around their love for their Savior and their love for their neighbor. We are all proud to have served Christ together.


