

Community Oriented Policing Program to Expand

During my time as Ward 9 Councilman, I, along with our community, have benefitted greatly from the work of our Community Oriented Police Officers. Council recently approved legislation that will result in the addition of 12 new police officers in the Community Oriented Policing Services program. The legislation authorized the Mayor to enter into an agreement with the U.S. Department of Justice, which is funding the training and hiring of military veterans as police officers for a period of three years. The estimated amount of federal funds to be awarded to Akron over the three-year grant period is \$1,500,000.00. Akron will provide a local cash match of \$1,643,700.00.

Kenmore Football Plans to Build on Last Years Foundation

The 2011 football season ended with the Cardinals winning their final two games, capping a 6-4 season and third place finish in the Akron City Series League. Kenmore manufactured this through hard work, dedication and support at all levels. The 2011 season was the foundation for future Cardinal teams and set the standard that Coach Ed Peltz calls, "a new minimum benchmark." The program had success throughout the year on the field, with post season awards and most importantly in the classroom.

The coaching staff is quick to point out that nothing is ever accomplished without people buying into the vision being promoted. From the end of the 2011 season so much positive has happened to the football program that we truly feel blessed. It started with having a number of our athletes named to all league teams, all district teams, and receiving accolades to the all state team. We also had the Division 2 Co-Defensive Player of the Year for Ohio. This was followed by Kenmore being well represented in two all start games, one featuring players from Summit County against our neighbors to the north, Cuyahoga County, and also in the Thanksgiving Day Game at St Vincent-St Mary.

Good news kept arriving as we were able to help a number of athletes acquire financial aid/scholarships to continue their educational learning and football careers. We are sending players to Muskingum College (Steve Vinson and Ke-vel Fields) and to West Liberty University (Darnell Vickers). We currently have a number of underclassmen getting looks from colleges across the country and Kenmore High School is becoming a frequent stop for many college football recruiters.

We want to thank the sponsors of our program who truly help us in so many ways. It is important that we support these businesses as they have truly been important to our program. When you come to Kenmore Stadium you will notice the stands have been freshly painted and the exterior of the locker room also received fresh paint. These tasks were completed by Akron City Schools and the bleachers were scrapped of chipping paint by volunteers. The interior of our locker room received a much needed power washing and painting by the volunteer organization, Project Shine, headed by Jeremy Veppert. This was much needed as the last time the locker room received this type of overhaul was more than 20 years ago. The group from First Glance has continued to support our team with providing a weekly meal for us along with spearheading a drive to help feed our athletes between two-a-day practices. This group is headed by Doug and Rachel Jones and we are thankful for their efforts, care and help with so many projects that make our program stronger. Rachel Jones is like a doting mom to our players and her personal touches to the locker room and our meals are truly appreciated. We would like to thank Mayor Don Plusquellic for his continued support of Kenmore Football, the schools and community. The mayor is truly a friend to our program and his support, leadership and ability to 'nudge' those that can help us is cherished. Finally, we

want to give a big Cardinal thank you to our councilman Mike Freeman. Mike has been instrumental in helping and guiding us with so many projects along with opening doors to assist our coaches provide a safe environment for our team. Mike is dedicated to the Kenmore community and is a shining star that makes Akron such a great place.

The 2012 season is expected to be one of continued growth of our football program. We have a number of holes to fill due to graduation of outstanding and talented young men, but we anticipate this year's team to build upon the success we had last year. The Cardinals have been very busy this summer facing some of the best area football teams in 7 on 7 passing scrimmages. Kenmore has held their own against the likes of Wadsworth, Medina, Tallmadge, Cloverleaf, Marlington, and Revere. This experience allows the team to work on fundamentals, develop team chemistry and stimulate the competitive approach that we as coaches look to create.

As two-a-day practices roll along we are working hard to build a strong program while at the same time work with our players to develop good work habits, take ownership of their responsibilities and be leaders in and out of school. On that note, Walker contends that none of this would be possible without the loving guidance and support of his mother and grandmother. "Yeah, the fridge looks a lot different these days, but they've been helping me from the very beginning and I love them both."


A group of Gremlins made Kenmore their home in the 1940's.

The Gremlins bantam football team participated in a league for local youth. The league consisted of nine teams: Kenmore Gremlins, St. Vincent Shamrocks, Eastside Corsairs, South Rangers, Central Flyers, West Hornets, North Commandos, Portage Lakes Panthers, and the Barberton Barons.


Kenmore resident Mike Donahue said the Gremlin locker room was located at the corner of 12th Street and Kenmore Boulevard, which was the old KHS basketball gym. They would get dressed there and walk up to the football practice field, where the KHS field is today, practice, then walk back down, shower and go home.

Mike played Jr. Bantams/Bantams in '48-'50. He played for the Gremlins when they defeated the Barberton Barons to win the Northeastern Ohio Bantamweight Football Association Championship in 1950. The Kenmore Klipper (community newspaper) declared "The fighting spirit of the boys for the entire season proves once again that champs are made, not born."

Director of the team was Bob Prentice from the Prentice Funeral Home. Jim Graham was assistant director. Coaches for the team were Bob Burke, Jim Abbott, Ray Endorsing and Jim Graham.

First Glance News

I first started coming to First Glance when I was 11 years old. I'm 22 now. I loved going to the First Glance Rec Nights, I had something to look forward to. I was always there. I hung out with my friends, talked to leaders, jumped rope, played on the computer, etc.

I was also the one causing almost all the trouble, I would fight someone for their just looking at me or saying the wrong thing to me. I know that wasn't right, but then I didn't care. Then I got kicked out, and I couldn't go there and hang out. It felt like my world ended those couple weeks. I couldn't wait to go back to First Glance. When I went back, I changed my attitude there. I didn't want to get kicked out again because those few weeks were the longest weeks of my life. Lesson learned.

When I was 16 years old, I met my boyfriend, Nate, and I stopped going to First Glance. I missed it, but I didn't want to miss a chance to hang out with him. We were dating for almost 2 months and I got pregnant. My life really changed at that moment. I stopped fighting and getting into trouble. When I was 4 months pregnant, I started going to First Glance Teen Moms. Mrs. Karen tried to get me to go sooner, but I just didn't want to go. Yes, I was being the old Kayelah again...hardheaded. Finally, I was like, "I've got to do something. I'm 17 years old and I'm about to have a baby. I don't know anything about being a mom." I babysat a lot, but being a mom is a whole world of difference.

I started going to First Glance Teen Moms. I did lessons on pregnancy, newborns, first year, toddler years, etc. I did hundreds of lessons. Yes, I think I did every lesson we had at Teen Moms. I also learned that being a mom is no walk in the park.

I was on welfare, and living with my dad. I didn't have a education because when I got pregnant I dropped out of school. I had to work for my cash assistance from welfare, which I had no problem doing. I looked at it as a chance to learn some job skills. I worked at a thrift store for almost a year, and then I worked at Mobile Meals for two years. My cash assistance was running out and they wouldn't hire me at Mobile Meals because they had enough workers there. They said they would hire me somewhere else in Mobile Meals, but I didn't own a car.

So, I talked to Mrs. Karen and she said First Glance was trying to get approved through the county so that the teen moms could come there and volunteer for their cash assistance. I was so happy. I couldn't wait until they got approved. Finally they were approved and I was the first one to work at First Glance. I started working at First Glance in September 2010.

My cash assistance ran out in November 2010, so Mrs. Karen helped me out once again and told me I could raise support to work at First Glance. She told me everything I had to do. Noelle, the Director of First Glance, was on vacation and had no clue what was going on until she checked her email! When Noelle came back, I guess she was fine with it because I still raise support to work here and she supports me!

I have been raising support to work at First Glance Teen Moms since December 2010, and am attending GED classes at Park Church. I love working here, and I wouldn't change it for anything.
