I am approaching the 20th Anniversary of my web site (and the 30th Anniversary of my business, but lets save that for another time). I cannot believe I have been using it for that long, time does fly when you are having fun (and with my business, it's all about the fun!). However, I think it is time for an update on how my website looks (calling Tom Lesiczka), but I am also trying to decide if I should drop a major feature of my site, and that is what has me thinking today.

Part of my product mix in my store is old/collectible comic books, and I have a lot (about 30,000 different). Not all are listed on my site, but since starting this job in 1997 probably about 70% are by now. It takes a lot of work to add & subtract these listings as I buy & sell these old comics. At peak sales around 2006, I was selling about \$2000 a month via the internet. Now last year in 2016 I was lucky to sell about \$50 a month.

Why the huge drop in sales? I think at this point that every comic book store in America has a web site, and with eBay & Craigslist added to this competition, there are many ways to find the same things I have to offer both faster & cheaper.

It has taken me years to get to the 1000+ pages which list the name, grade, and value of these old comics, so it is hard to decide to just give up on what I have done. But it takes more than a few hours every week to add the new ones & subtract the ones sold, and all for \$50 a month in internet sales? The time involved is not worth the small sales I receive, and since I still do great with the walk-in traffic my store gets when selling these collectible comic books, maybe it is time to quit wasting time on this aspect of my web site.

So, while looking into a face lift for my web site, I need to think about what is worth putting ON my web site. I still plan to list new items that I purchase from collections & such, because the new always gets attention from most of my on-line customers. But is it worth listing old comics that have been in my store for years, and my regular customers (both in-store and on-line) don't even look at any more, well that's another subject.

It's hard to give up a business habit after doing it for years and years, but sometimes you just need to let go and concentrate on new ways of doing business.
